FROM THE RECTOR - 6th Sunday after Epiphany (resumed)

He reveals these things to us in parables to keep our minds and hearts attuned to Him and the power of His words. So too, St. Paul reminds the Thessalonians of the power of the word to transform society and culture through not only that which is spoken but also the manner in which we live lives of charity and obedience to Him alone. Now more than ever we will need to work to build the kingdom here as we long for its fulfillment in Christ. Through small and unassuming acts of charity, striving for authentic harmony and peace in God in Christ, we make manifest the living God in our daily lives. Consequently, let us hold fast and sure to that which God has promised – a kingdom of peace, mercy, and love abounding for those who listen to the Master's voice and follow Him. We are not complete until we see God face to face. Let us strive now in this life for true joy that is found only in the Lord!

The celebration of the Divine Office is the framework for the Church's daily life of prayer, which culminates in the offering of Holy Mass. In earlier centuries, this prayer cycle was a part of daily parish life. Its popularity waned in the 20th century, despite the regular urging of popes and the Fathers of Vatican II that pastors return it to parish churches.

As we begin this important enhancement of our common prayer life, we will offer a series of three presentations in order to provide an orientation to praying the Divine Office.

- 1. Tuesday 9 November: The Divine Office: an introduction.
- 2. Tuesday 16 November: The Divine Office: the calendar.
- 3. Tuesday 23 November: The Divine Office: the structure.

Over these three evenings, we will provide an overview of the history, theology, structure, and spirituality of the Office, and its intimate relationship to Holy Mass. Each presentation will begin at 7:00 pm and end by 8:30pm. We invite everyone to join us and hope as many as possible will be able to attend.

SOLEMNITY OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION

The Immaculate Conception will be celebrated this year on Wednesday, 8 December 2021. In addition to the normal evening Holy Mass at 6:30 pm, there will also be a Holy Mass celebrated at 12:15 pm that day. So too, in addition to confessions at 5:00 pm, they will also be available at 11:00 am. There will be **NO** Adoration on this day.

THE RORATE CAELI MASS:

When: 11 December 2021 @ 6:30 am

The Rorate Caeli Mass is a traditional Advent devotion wherein the Mass of the Blessed Virgin Mary for Advent is offered just before dawn.

The Mass takes its title, Rorate Caeli, from the first words of the Introit, which are from Isaiah 45:8:

"Rorate, caeli, desuper, et nubes pluant justum, aperiatur terra, et germinet Salvatorem."

"Drop down dew, ye heavens, from above, and let the clouds rain the just: let the earth be opened and bud forth a Saviour."

The Rorate Mass is lit only by candlelight. Because it is a votive Mass in Mary's honor, white vestments are worn instead of Advent violet. In the dimly lit setting, priests and faithful prepare to honor the Light of the world, Who is soon to be born, and offer praise to God for the gift of Our Lady. As the Mass proceeds and sunrise approaches, the church becomes progressively brighter, illumined by the sun as our Faith is illumined by Christ.

The readings and prayers of the Mass foretell the prophecy of the Virgin who would bear a Son called Emmanuel and call on all to raise the gates of their hearts and their societies to let Christ the King enter; asking for the grace to receive eternal life by the merits of the Incarnation and saving Resurrection of Our Lord.

ON CELEBRATING THE DIVINE OFFICE: Allowing our prayers to rise like incense

The celebration of the Divine Office is the framework for the Church's daily life of prayer, which culminates in the offering of Holy Mass. In earlier centuries, this prayer cycle was a part of daily parish life. Its popularity waned in the 20th century, despite the regular urging of popes and the Fathers of Vatican II that pastors return it to parish churches.

Over the past several years, the Oratory has celebrated various hours of the Divine Office publicly: for the feast of St Louis the King, for Christmas, and for Tenebrae, the Office of the Triduum, sung during Holy Week. In order to prepare for a return to this great and ancient form of prayer to our Oratory life, these series of three presentations will provide an orientation to praying the Divine Office.

These three evenings will provide an overview of the history, theology, structure, and spirituality of the Office, and its intimate relationship to Holy Mass. Each presentation will begin at 7:00pm and end by 8:30pm. We invite everyone to join us and hope as many as possible will be able to attend.

WHO: Mr. Stan Metheny: Stan Metheny earned a Master of Arts degree in Theology in 1976 and in the decades since has pursued further post graduate studies in liturgy and Gregorian chant in various universities and in various monasteries of the Solesmes congregation. His primary focus has been on the manuscripts and chants of the Divine Office. He has been a schola director for over 40 years and has led workshops in the US and the UK devoted to teaching the chants of the Office.

Besides, there is in the Psalms a certain wonderful power for stimulating zeal in men's minds for all the virtues. For although all our Scripture, both the Old and New, is divinely inspired and useful for doctrine, as it is written, the Book of Psalms, like a paradise containing in itself (the fruits) all the others, gives forth songs, and with them also shows its own songs in psalmody (cantus edit, et proprios insuper cum ipsis inter psallendum exhibet). Such are the words of Athanasius (Epist. Ad Marcell. Op. cit. no. 2), who rightly adds in the same place: "To me it seems that the psalms for him who sings them are as a mirror in which he may contemplate himself and the movements of his soul and, under this influence, recite them" (op. cit. no. 12).
