OCTAVE OF CHRISTMAS

EPIPHANY 2024

The Vigil Mass for The Epiphany of Our Lord will be celebrated on Friday, 5 January 2024. Since this is also First Friday, there will be two Holy Masses for the Vigil: Holy Mass will be celebrated at 12:15 pm preceded by confessions @ 11:00 am and the evening Mass @ 7:15 with confessions @ 6:00 pm (this is the normal First Friday schedule). At the conclusion of the 12:15 pm Holy Mass, water and salt will be blessed, as is our tradition. As we did last year, to better facilitate the blessing of Epiphany water, no outside containers will be allowed. Enough water and salt will be blessed and made available to the faithful after Holy Mass and for as long as the water remains. The Feast of the Epiphany (6 January 2024) will follow the normal Saturday schedule: Holy Masses @ 8:15 am with confessions @ 8:00 am.

A STORY ABOUT OUR BELL

Christians and secularists alike take for granted the presence of bells in old church bell towers. The Church's use of large bells to summon the faithful to prayer stretches back to the roots of monasticism in third century A.D. However, what many do not know is that bells are not simply a nostalgic remnant from a bygone era, but living sacramentals which bear an important role in spiritual warfare and the sanctification of the world around us.

The blessing of church bells, so sacramentally rich it is often called a Baptism, began as early as the 11th century. At a bell's Baptism, which may only be performed by a bishop, it is washed with Holy Water, anointed inside and out with both Chrism and the Oil of the Sick, incensed, and prayed over with the solemn words:

Let the people's faith and piety wax stronger whenever they hear its melodious peals. At its sound let all evil spirits be driven afar; let thunder and lightning, hail and storm be banished; let the power of your hand put down the evil powers of the air, causing them to tremble at the sound of this bell, and to flee at the sight of the holy cross engraved thereon ... when the peal of this bell resounds in the clouds may a legion of angels stand watch over the assembly of your Church, the first-fruits of the faithful, and afford your ever-abiding protection to them in body and spirit.

Thus, even though we do not see our bell up in the tower here at the Oratory, we can be sure that its peals have true spiritual power against the forces of darkness which we see running rampant even here in the very neighborhood of the church.

After spring rains damaged the electrical system which previously rang the Oratory bell, a team of Oratory members conducted a brief study on how to make our bell ring once again. They determined that the simplest solution was also the most traditional - to restore the bell's manual pull-rope system which had been abandoned sometime in the '60s. The original weathered old rope and great wooden wheel still rest in the corner of the bell tower amidst decades' accumulation of pigeon and squirrel bones. Now, about fifty feet of new rope runs from the bell's current iron wheel through special holes in the bell tower's two tall stories straight into the side choir loft where it is accessible to the altar boy tasked with the porter's duty of ringing the bell. Manual ringing by rope not only allows the bell to swing as it was designed even as far as 360 degrees around its cradle and thus produce a more beautiful sound, it also bears a greater spiritual beauty. Whether the bell rings in fast "peals" on joyous occasions, or slow "tolls" for days of sorrow, one knows that a member of the faithful, usually a young boy, uses his own hands to ring the bell with prayer and love; it no longer owes its voice to a soulless electrical system installed merely for ease and convenience.

May we faithful of the Oratory thank the Lord for the gift of our bell and keep our hearts ever open to the bountiful graces it brings.

THE VESTIBULE OF THE CHURCH

Steps have been taken to make our Church even more beautiful. One of the primary means of success has been to simply keep things clean. To that end, everyone is asked to be cognizant of picking up trash that they may see, keeping the bathroom clean after personal use, and generally being attentive to being good stewards of this place of worship. **Particularly**: the vestibule of Church should **NOT** be used as a delivery stop for personal goods being passed between individuals or families. So too, there is a basket marked *Lost & Found* which will be emptied every two weeks. Any items left in the vestibule without prior permission from the Rector and not in the *Lost & Found* will be thrown away immediately. In advance, thank you for your attentiveness to this concern.

If you wish to have items blessed, please drop them off at the rectory (Mon-Fri, 9am-2pm) and include your name and telephone number. Please make sure all items are clearly marked. Once Msgr. Morris or Fr. Rennier have blessed the items Donna Mueller, Administrative Assistant to the Rector, will call you to let you know the items are ready for pick up (from the rectory office, Mon-Fri, 9am-2pm). The rectory offices should be accessed through the front door on Dale Avenue, across from the field parking lot.

Our coffee is locally roasted specifically for us in small batches from a single-origin, fair trade source. 100% of the profits go to support the Oratory and fund our coffee hours. The roast is a medium-light roast and the cup of coffee that results is well-balanced and easy to drink, with notes of citrus but still sweet with a clean taste.

FROM THE RECTOR

This year, this Sunday in the Octave of Christmas is at the end of what has been a beautiful celebration of feasts and saints reminding us of the fullness of the Paschal Mystery revealed in its inception with the Incarnation. These octave days are given to us precisely because the profundity of this great mystery is not sufficiently experienced in just one day or one celebration. Instead, the Church gives us eight days to ponder the glories of the Christ Child and His willingness to become one with His creation. So too, we are never alone in our contemplation but continue to be aided by our Blessed Mother who reveals the necessity of trust and confidence in the Lord even when experiences are beyond our understanding. Moreover, we have the witness of the Holy Innocents and the martyr, Stephen who shed their blood for Christ, one at the beginning of the Incarnation and the other at the beginning of the glorious Resurrection of the Lord. The blood of the martyrs is not in conflict with Christmas joy but rightly situates the power of the Cross and its Triumph over sin and death. This power and triumph have already been made manifest in the baby in the arms of His Mother. The words of St. John the Evangelist in his Prologue give us even further opportunity for meditation as we sit in joy before the Word Made Flesh and rejoice in the generosity, love, and mercy of Our Heavenly Father who gives us the gift of His Son. As we rejoice in Christ our King present among us, let us rededicate ourselves to His service; let us join Our Lady, Simeon, and the prophetess Anna in recognizing that our salvation is now at hand!
