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PRIESTHOOD ORDINATION

At the Cathedral Basilica of St. Louis on Saturday, 25 May 2024 @ 10:00 am, Rev. Mr. Joseph Martin will be ordained to the holy priesthood for the Archdiocese of Saint Louis. Joseph is in seminary at Kenrick-Glennon Seminary and a parishioner of the Oratory of Ss. Gregory and Augustine. His parents, Drs. Jeff and Ann Martin, are also parishioners of the Oratory. Two other men will be ordained with Deacon Martin on that. This is a great day for the Oratory and for the Archdiocese of Saint Louis. In the short, yet powerful

history of the Oratory, Joseph is our first priestly vocation. Everyone is encouraged to attend the ordination and to pray for him and the other men being ordained with him.

Fr. Martin will celebrate is First Mass of Thanksgiving here at the Oratory on Sunday, 26 May 2024 @ 1:30 pm in the afternoon. Everyone is welcome to attend the Holy Mass and then join the celebration of after the Holy Mass.

CORPUS CHRISTI PROCESSION

The External Solemnity of Corpus Christi will be celebrated on Sunday, 2 June 2024. The Oratory is blessed to have a Corpus Christi procession through the streets of Richmond Heights. The procession will begin immediately after the conclusion of the 10:00 am Holy Mass. In addition to our First Communicants, (and other First Communicants who would have made their First Holy Communion in a different parish this year), the procession will include a Knights of Columbus Honor Guard, the Girls' Guild, the choir & schola leading us in various hymns and the opportunity during our procession to pray the Rosary, the Divine Mercy Chaplet, and other prayers to assist us in giving fitting glory and praise to our Eucharistic Lord. 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ELECTRICAL WORK

As a reminder: there will be workers on campus; work going on in the Church at various times throughout the day; scaffolding in the Church proper will be in place for at least a month. It is my hope that this work will be completed by early June, and we will see vast improvements for our beautiful Church. Please remain patient with the various inconveniences with which we will all contend. Finally, I ask for everyone's fervent prayers for a successful completion of the project and for the continued longevity and stability of the Oratory. BACULUS CANTORALIS

The baculus cantoralis (cantor's staff) is a custom that originated in Antioch, representing the role of the precentor (head cantor). Spiritually, staff commemorates the Jewish Pasch ritual, when one has to eat the meal standing up holding a staff to commemorate the Exodus. These staves are mentioned in the Ordines Romani, a series of early and medieval treatises on liturgical rubrics. Historically, the baculus cantoralis was present in centers of solemn liturgy across Christendom (East and West), in common use until the twentieth century in France, Spain, Portugal, Germany, England, Belgium, and South America (by way of the Spanish). In France, the baculus was a heraldic mark for cantors. In certain places, not only the precentor, but all the cantors had their "batons." A common application of the baculus was to have two staves, used by the leader of each side of liturgical choir, to tap the rhythm of the chant on the ground, or to point at the cantor who was to intone the next chant. There are also rubrics given for the precentor to discipline cantors who misbehave or sleep during divine services with the baculus. The schola would like to thank one of its members for constructing the wooden stand for the use of our own baculus cantoralis. In the future, the schola hopes to add a miniature carving of St. Louis IX on the top of the staff.

FROM THE WELLSPRING OF TRADITION ... WHAT ARE ROGATION DAYS?

They are times in which entreaties for safety, salvation, and a good harvest are made through a litany to God and the saints. The prayers' plaintive aspect gives the days their name: "rogation" is from the Latin rogare, to petition earnestly. These litanies are meant to be made during a procession in which the priest blesses his parishioners' land [in rural communities]. The processions were not mandatory, but reciting the litany was required of clerics if they missed them before Mass. Indeed, the word litaneia (litany) means essentially the same thing in Greek as the Latin rogare; and so powerful was the association of Rogationtide with processing that they were once called "Gang Days," from an Old English word for walking.

There were many Rogation Days in the calendar of the ancient Church, some on set dates during the year, others at times of particular crises. Currently, there are two sets of Rogation Days. The first, the "Major" or "Greater" Litanies, are celebrated on April 25th (which later also became the Feast of St. Mark). On that day the ancient Romans held the Robigalia, a procession to appease Robigo, the god of blight. Since the Church had no objection to praying for the harvest, it threw out Robigo and the ribald games held in his honor while keeping the procession; it even kept much of the same route. One theory for the title "major litanies" is the elaborate "seven-part-litany" in Rome that St. Gregory the Great instituted during his pontificate, in which seven divisions of people [clerics, other men, monks, virgins, married women, widows, and children] were assigned to process to different churches.

The "Minor" or "Lesser" Litanies are celebrated on the three days preceding Ascension Thursday. While the Major Rogation Day is of Roman origin, the Minor Rogations are the product of Gaul, instituted in A.D. 470 by Bishop Mamertus of Vienne in response to a terrifying series of catastrophes (storms, floods, earthquakes, wild beasts, etc.). In cooperation with the civil authorities, Mamertus decreed that the faithful should fast, abstain from servile work, and do penance. The practice soon spread throughout France and Germany, and eventually Charlemagne pressured Pope Leo III to add them to the Roman rite. The Pope acquiesced on condition that the fast be removed; in gratitude the Franks removed theirs as well.

Despite the unmistakable stamp of the Latin West, the essence of Rogationtide goes back to the Old Testament, when the cantor would recite something and the congregation would reply with a verse such as "His mercy endureth forever" (Ps. 135). Litanies are the most sensible form of prayer for pedestrians, as they enable both cantor and congregation to catch their breath between verses. The Israelites also prayed for blessings on their crops and homes at certain key points of the year. In fact, two of the three great annual feasts—the Feast of Weeks (Pentecost) and of Tabernacles—were related to the harvest.

Christianity retained the spirit of both practices, and rightfully so, as everything in the Old Testament is meant to instruct us on a deeper figurative level in the art of living well. Litanies such as the Kyrie eleison, for example, were treasured by both Eastern and Western Christians, as were blessings over the fruits of the earth. And processions not only dramatize the radiation of the Light from the Church to the world, they epitomize our status as pilgrims passing through this earthly way station.

Even if one cannot participate in a procession, the litany and Mass of Rogation (which are the same throughout Rogationtide) are worth praying. In the prescribed Litany of the Saints, God and His holy ones are first invoked in so perfect a theological and historical order that one can survey most of Church history simply by reciting it. The litany then prays for deliverance from a host of physical and spiritual evils, reminding one of the fragility of life. Next, the faithful request a series of blessings, such as a restoration "to the unity of Church all who have strayed from the truth," "the fruits of the earth," and "eternal rest to all the faithful departed." Finally, after chanting or reciting Psalm 69, the priest prays ten collects of exceptional quality. When the litany is finished, the Mass begins, the central theme of which is the efficacy of prayer, especially for the righteous and humble. Thus, the Epistle mentions Elias' successful prayer for rain and the Gospel contains the passage, "Ask and it shall be given you." Happily, Holy Church still grants a partial indulgence for praying the Litany of the Saints.

The Lesser Litanies are also a good preparation for Ascension Thursday. Psychologically, it is difficult to maintain the jubilance of Paschaltide for forty consecutive days. The penitential character of Minor Rogation allows for an emotional dénouement so that we may rejoice all the more for the novena from Ascension Thursday to Pentecost. FROM THE RECTOR

This Sunday after the Ascension is an opportunity to prepare for the coming of the Holy Spirit. Of course, it is situated in the context of the Lord's glorious Ascension to His place in the Heaven. Often times, the glories of the Ascension are overshowed by the Resurrection and Pentecost, celebrations and feasts that on one level relate more to our lived experiences of sin, forgiveness, and the power of the Spirit. However, the celebration of the Ascension sets before us the fullness of the Paschal Mystery now complete as Christ takes His place at the right hand of the Father. It is from heaven that Our Savior continues the work of priestly mediation, interceding on our behalf to the heavenly Father for forgiveness and mercy. So too, the Ascension is the celebration of the king's enthronement. Having established His kingdom on the cross, Our Lord now takes possession of His kingdom, sitting upon His throne and bringing with Him the fruits of the Incarnation. As the disciples watched Our Lord ascend to glory, they were admonished to return to Jerusalem and wait for the Holy Spirit. This is specifically what we are doing today: preparing ourselves for the coming of the Spirit. We do this through steadfast prayer and constant faith and hope. The Lord has not left us alone but sends the Spirit to teach, admonish, and bind us together. As we await the coming of the Holy Spirit, let us, like the apostles, rejoice in the glories of the Savior!

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
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
