WEEKLY COLLECTION/TITHING

Asking for money is never easy; I am grateful that the generosity of the faithful of the Oratory of Ss. Gregory and Augustine, have made it possible for me to limit asking for money. However, as the new budget is submitted to the Archdiocese, it is time again to encourage your continued to support; to ask that everyone prayerfully consider increasing their donation; to ask those who either never give or give little, to consider increasing their donation. I want to specifically encourage those who have not given to share the responsibility of caring for the Oratory along with the other generous members of the community. While the giving of the faithful of the Oratory generally surpasses that of other parish entities, there are still a significant number of registered parishioners who fail to contribute each fiscal year. I realize that the financial situations of each person are unique, and some may not be in a position to give, but I would still ask everyone to contribute something. As I often say when raising money for Covenant Network-Catholic Radio, no amount is too small!

Each year, the needed weekly collection number has increased, and this fiscal year is no different. Beginning 7 July 2024, the targeted weekly collection amount is \$17, 869. The increase reflects the continued growth of the Oratory, more personnel for our liturgical celebrations and the on-going maintenance and improvement of the physical plant itself. Regarding the maintenance and improvement of the physical plant, part of the work on the electric system is included in this new budget. It is also anticipated that there will be some work done on the parking area near the garage. There is still work to be accomplished on the outside of the Church and Rectory as well as work to be accomplished on the whole parking lot.

I would ask everyone for their continued generosity as we continue to grow. Our fiscal responsibility indicates to the Archdiocese our ability to sustain ourselves and contributes to our longevity and stability. In advance, thank you so much and may God reward your generosity.

PARKING ON CAMPUS

The Oratory has the happy problem of more faithful than available parking spaces. It is appreciated that for the 8:00 am and 10:00 am Holy Masses finding a spot can be difficult. Please, however, only park in designated areas. Regarding the middle parking lot between the Church and the school building: Park only in those spots that have a parking curb in front of them. **DO NOT** park in front of the garage, **DO NOT** park in the spots on the lot east of the garage which are all reserved spots. **DO NOT** park near the trashcans. Everyone's attention to this is greatly appreciated.

PRO-LIFE UPDATES:

Missouri Right to Life: Update on Pro-Abortion Initiative – Signatures to put a right to unlimited abortion in our State Constitution were turned into the Secretary of State on May 3rd. While they gathered more than twice what was required in raw numbers, they were also required to get specific amounts in each Congressional District based on the votes in the last gubernatorial election. They were also required to gain legible signatures from only Missouri registered voters and only from the county of the petition they were signing. We are awaiting validation of those signatures from the Secretary of State at this time. Please offer prayers and fasting that there aren't enough signatures to put this on the November 2024 ballot.

FROM THE WELLSPRING OF TRADITION: ACT OF CONTRITION

When we prepare for and go to confession, it's quite natural to feel bad about ourselves. After all, in that process, we're bringing to mind all the worst parts about ourselves, the parts we're embarrassed about, dislike, or find endlessly frustrating. Because of this difficulty, some people begin to feel that God cannot possibly love them or that their contrition is not sincere enough. They begin to doubt that they are actually forgiven. They try to confess old sins that have already been forgiven and worry about the effectiveness of past confessions.

Before I was Catholic, I remember asking God to forgive my sins over and over again. I wasn't sure if I was sorry enough or if God had heard me. As Catholics, though, we don't need to suffer from this issue. Why? Because we have access to God's forgiving grace through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. In order to understand what's really going on during our confessions it helps to take a look at the act of contrition.

The version that most of us have learned asks God to have mercy on us for two reasons: 1) because we fear going to hell, and 2) because our sins offend God. That first reason, fear of hell, is a prayer of imperfect contrition. We are sorry for our sins but not entirely for the right reason. We're afraid of punishment, but perhaps it hasn't sunk in that our sins are wrong not because of punishment but because we injure God, whom we love. This contrition for an offense against God, the second reason we're sorry for our sins, is a more perfect form of contrition. We strive for the more perfect contrition, but if all we can muster up is sorrow over possibly going to hell, that's not an ideal reason for seeking forgiveness, but it is enough.

The reason it's enough is because, regardless of what reasons brought us into the confessional, *our contrition is rarely, if ever, perfect*. We always have mixed motives, nagging doubts, that little concern that we should be feeling worse or that we're going to commit the same sin again. Don't allow this imperfection to rattle your faith or doubt your salvation. Remember, we're saved by grace, not by our own works-righteousness. All of our merit and good works are valuable only insofar as they cooperate with the work of Our Lord at the Cross. Without the Cross, we cannot earn Heaven, but united to the Cross? Well, then our good works become efficacious beyond our abilities, including our contrition.

Praying the act of contrition is important when we go to confession because it's our best effort, and that's what God asks of us. Our best. Our contrition then becomes the basis of the sacrament, the manner in which it operates. It is absolutely necessary that some sort of contrition exists on our part, even if it's very much imperfect, so try your best to be contrite and pray the prayer with sincerity.

And then, in that magnificent way God has, he takes that which is imperfect in us and makes it perfect. Christ himself sorrows in us and for us. In his mercy, he unites himself to us and perfects our contrition. That perfect contrition then becomes the basis on which he judges us for our sins and forgives us. Even if you walk into the confessional feeling like a horrible sinner, even if you feel guilty and unforgivable, know that in the confessional, Our Lord knows you intimately, including all the worst parts of you. He loves you anyway. For your honesty, he loves you more. For your imperfect attempts to be sorrowful and make amends, he loves you more.

This is why we don't need to re-confess past sins again, and why we can exit the confessional knowing that we are absolved of our sins, loved, and set free.





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
