One of the hidden blessings has been the generosity of our young people in responding to the call of a religious vocation. Two years ago, Br. Peter Mary of the Cross (Colton Marks) departed the Oratory to begin his new life as a Discalced Hermit of Our Lady of Mount Carmel in Fairfield, Pennsylvania. He was followed by Br. Matthew of Jesus and Mary (Kevin Murphy). This past Christmas, Br. WEEKLY COLLECTION/TITHING

Asking for money is never easy; I am grateful that the generosity of the faithful of the Oratory of Ss. Gregory and Augustine, have made it possible for me to limit asking for money. However, as the new budget is submitted to the Archdiocese, it is time again to encourage your continued to support; to ask that everyone prayerfully consider increasing their donation; to ask those who either never give or give little, to consider increasing their donation. I want to specifically encourage those who have not given to share the responsibility of caring for the Oratory along with the other generous members of the community. While the giving of the faithful of the Oratory generally surpasses that of other parish entities, there are still a significant number of registered parishioners who fail to contribute each fiscal year. I realize that the financial situations of each person are unique, and some may not be in a position to give, but I would still ask everyone to contribute something. As I often say when raising money for Covenant Network-Catholic Radio, no amount is too small!

Each year, the needed weekly collection number has increased, and this fiscal year is no different. Beginning 7 July 2024, the targeted weekly collection amount is \$17, 869. The increase reflects the continued growth of the Oratory, more personnel for our liturgical celebrations and the on-going maintenance and improvement of the physical plant itself. Regarding the maintenance and improvement of the physical plant, part of the work on the electric system is included in this new budget. It is also

anticipated that there will be some work done on the parking area near the garage. There is still work to be accomplished on the outside of the Church and Rectory as well as work to be accomplished on the whole parking lot.

I would ask everyone for their continued generosity as we continue to grow. Our fiscal responsibility indicates to the Archdiocese our ability to sustain ourselves and contributes to our longevity and stability. In advance, thank you so much and may God reward your generosity.

FROM THE WELLSPRING OF TRADITION: HOUSELING CLOTH

The word 'houseling' comes from an archaic English word for sacrifice/Eucharist, based on Old English $h\bar{u}$ sel. As a noun it meant 'sacrifice' for pagans and came to be used for 'Mass' for Catholics, and as a verb it came to mean to offer or distribute the Eucharist. It is the name of the cloth that covers the communion rail during the distribution of Holy Communion to the faithful. So what's the story behind this big bit of linen and how should it be used?

First, some history. You might not have noticed that, like preaching, the *Missale Romanum* has no provision for the reception of Holy Communion by the faithful in the *Ordo Missae* prior to 1965. All traditional Roman Rite missals have only the celebrant's reception of both sacred species and then go immediately on to the ablutions of the celebrant's fingers and the chalice. We can go into the theology of this another time, but for many centuries prior to the 20th century Holy Communion would more often than not be distributed to the faithful apart from Holy Mass. The rite for this is found in the *Rituale Romanum*, the book with ceremonies for the sacraments, sacramentals, processions, and rites other than Holy Mass and the Divine Office. On those occasions—which for many centuries were relatively rare—when the people other than the celebrant did receive Communion during Holy Mass, the *Ordo Missae* was interrupted, and certain elements of the *Rite for the distribution of Holy Communion outside of Mass* were used to accompany the distribution. This is also the reason we have another *Confiteor*, often called 'the third' because there are already two in the Prayers at the Foot of the Altar, to be recited by the communicants. Communion was almost never distributed at Solemn Masses, funerals, and weddings, except to the bride and groom in a Nuptial Mass. Traditional rubrical manuals before the 1960s give the rubrics for the distribution of Holy Communion in a separate section, as it would most often be a separate rite in a separate space.

That rite prescribed that two altar servers hold a linen cloth underneath the chins of any and all communicants other than the celebrant. When it became customary for communicants to receive at an altar rail, the cloth became a part of the rail rather than be held by servers. Fr. Augustine Joseph Schulte describes this in a *Catholic Encyclopedia* (1908) article on the 'Altar Rail':

The *Rituale Romanum* (tit. iv, cap. ii, n. I) prescribes that a clean white cloth be extended before those who receive Holy Communion. This cloth is to be of fine linen, as it is solely intended as a sort of corporal to receive the particles which may by chance fall from the hands of the priest. It is usually fastened on the sanctuary side and when in use is drawn over the top of the rail. It should extend the full length of the rail, and be about two feet wide, so that the communicant, taking it in both hands, may hold it under his chin. Its very purpose suggests that it is not to be made of lace or netting, although there is nothing to forbid its having a border of fine lace or embroidery. Instead of this cloth a gilt paten*, larger than the paten used at the altar, to which a handle may be attached, or a small gilt or silver salver, or a pall, larger than the chalice pall, may be used as well.

*Another historical note: it was actually not until 1929 that the paten was required, and the use of the houseling cloth began to fall away in more places. (Yes, here is one more 'traditional' element that is in fact a recent change. It's important to know the *real* history and tradition of the Roman rite.)

Besides the practical purpose of catching particles of the Sacred Host lest they fall to the ground, the cloth has a rich symbolic value. (1) White linen clothes the rail, just as white linen clothes the altar, both as a reminder of our divine Lord's shroud in the tomb that enwrapped His sacred body, reminding us that at Holy Mass we are present at our Lord's death and that we receive His risen body in Holy Communion. (2) It's also a reminder of our baptism, the sacrament that gives us the ability to receive the other sacraments in their proper course. We—or our godparents on our behalf—promised at baptism that would do our utmost to keep our souls as white as our baptismal garment. When we put our hands beneath the cloth, it should also remind us of that white garment and those sacred promises. (3) White is the color of purity and should be a reminder that we should only come forward to receive if our hearts and minds are pure from serious sin and from things that detract us from the love of God and neighbor. I.e., that we are doing our best to live those baptismal promises.


