SOLEMNITY OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION

Please note: The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (the USCCB) in consultation and receiving clarification from the Vatican have reminded the faithful that as the Feast of the Immaculate Conception is transferred to Monday, 9 December 2024 in the Novus Ordo, the faithful must attend Holy Mass that Monday to fulfill the obligation of the Holy Day. For the Oratory this means even as we have already celebrated the Immaculate Conception, the faithful are obligated to attend Holy Mass that day. To assist the Oratory in fulfilling this obligation, in addition to the normal daily Mass schedule, Holy Mass will be celebrated at 6:30 pm as well (on Monday, 9 December); NO confessions preceding the evening Mass. The office will be closed on Monday as well.

THE RORATE CAELI MASS

When: 14 December 2023 @ 6:30 am

The Rorate Caeli Mass is a traditional Advent devotion wherein the Mass of the Blessed Virgin Mary for Advent is offered just before dawn.

The Mass takes its title, Rorate Caeli, from the first words of the Introit, which are from Isaiah 45:8:

"Rorate, caeli, desuper, et nubes pluant justum, aperiatur terra, et germinet Salvatorem." ("Drop down dew, ye heavens, from above, and let the clouds rain the just: let the earth be opened and bud forth a Saviour.")

The Rorate Mass is lit only by candlelight. Because it is a votive Mass in Mary's honor, white vestments are worn instead of Advent violet. In the dimly lit setting, priests and faithful prepare to honor the Light of the world, Who is soon to be born, and offer praise to God for the gift of Our Lady. As the Mass proceeds and sunrise approaches, the church becomes progressively brighter, illumined by the sun as our Faith is illumined by Christ. The readings and prayers of the Mass foretell the prophecy of the Virgin who would bear a Son called Emmanuel and call on all to raise the gates of their hearts and their societies to let Christ the King enter; asking for the grace to receive eternal life by the merits of the Incarnation and saving Resurrection of Our Lord.

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DEVOTION TO THE HOLY FACE OF JESUS - BOOKS

Please accept a copy of "The Secret of the Holy Face" by Fr. Lawrence Carney as a donation to all parishioners available in the vestibule of the Church today. In addition to the book by Fr. Carney, you will find available a small booklet to assist you in learning about and then practicing this devotion.

Given the course of events occurring in our country and within the Church, especially with regard to the current growth of Communism, it is recommended that Catholics understand and pray the Holy Face Devotion. This powerful devotion was given to mankind by our Lord and evolved as a weapon to combat the evils of Communism when it first appeared. Though the devotion became less popular, primarily after Vatican II, many Catholics now believe there is an urgent and renewed need for this prayerful exercise given its promises.

24th (Last) Sunday after Pentecost

Numerous miracles are associated with this devotion which has the full approval of the Catholic Church. In 1843 the Lord spoke these words Sr. Marie de Saint Pierre, a Carmelite nun, in Tours:

"The earth is covered with crimes. The violation of the first three Commandments of God has irritated My Father. The Holy Name of God blasphemed, and the Holy Day of the Lord profaned, filling up the measure of iniquities. These sins have risen into the throne of God and provoked his wrath which will soon burst forth if justice be not appeased. At no time have these crimes reached such a pitch."

In 1845, the Reparative Mystery of the Holy Face was revealed to Sister Saint-Pierre as the Lord stated: "I seek Veronicas to wipe and venerate My Holy Face which has few adorers... and by My Holy Face, you will work many miracles."

The Lord gave Sister Saint-Pierre the Golden Arrow prayer as special reparation for blasphemy. She then prayed the rosary asking Our Lady's intercession in helping her to get the Lord's message to others. Shortly thereafter Mary's apparition at La Salette followed which affirmed the Lord's words to Sister Saint-Pierre, "The Church will be in eclipse."

The revelations to Sister Saint Pierre are also at the foundation of Our Lady's warning at Fatima, regarding the spread of atheistic errors of secular humanism, Socialism, and religious suppression contained in Communism and of revolutionary men.

Please consider studying and praying the Holy Face Devotion for our country and for Holy Mother Church in these challenging times.

WELLSPRING OF TRADITION: ALL SOULS DAY

As is the case with some other feasts in the Roman calendar, the Commemoration of the Souls of All the Faithful Departed, commonly known as All Souls Day, originated with Odilo, the 11c abbot of Cluny, which was a very wealthy abbey with a vast network of daughter houses. This gave it considerable clout over the Western church and more often than not Cluny and their Cistercian descendants got what they wanted. But praying for the dead goes back to the earliest days of Christianity, who inherited the practice from late Judaism (Cf. 2 Mc 12:46). Our oldest extant written evidence of a Roman liturgy for the dead, the Ordo defunctorum, come from an early 8c manuscript. Like most extant manuscripts of the Roman rite, however, many of its elements were from a much earlier time. In this case, the rite contained there coalesced around same time as the Roman Canon, sometime in the 4c. We can see preserved in the Roman Canon of the Mass this attitude of early Christians toward the dead: they are in a place of rest, a locum refrigerii, lucis, et pacis. Like the Canon, these early rites contained elements from even earlier times, including some that were taking shape as the cult of the martyrs expanded over the course of the 2nd & 3rd centuries. E.g., the opening words of the Introit Requiem aeternam can be found on a 3rd century epitaph. In early chant manuscripts, we already find an Agenda Mortuorum, a complete liturgy for the deceased, with the same Introit and Gradual as in today's Mass. Initially, the Office hours formed a distinct formulary for the dead, but the Mass formulary was simply the Mass of the day. Then special prayers for the deceased were added on to that, and eventually entire Mass formularies for the dead evolved. It's a good example of how genuine organic growth occurs. Please note here that this was a complete liturgy: Mass celebrated within its proper context of the Divine Office. It remains so even today, to the point that even the Liber Usualis, an extraction from the official liturgical books designed as a handbook for parishes as its original title denotes, presents the Mass for the Dead and its accompanying rites within the hours of the Office in which it is set: Vespers, Matins, Lauds. Indeed, the elements of the formulary for the dead are an integrated whole: (1) taking the body from the home to the Church, (2) reception of the body into the Church, (3) Vespers, (4) Matins & Lauds, (5) Holy Mass, (6) Absolution, (7) burial. (N.B. these rites were celebrated in addition to the Office of the day.)

Unlike most other Mass chants used in the Roman rite, the chants for the formulary for the dead are a 'stark contrast' as one scholar puts it. They developed separately from and remained fluid and varied until rather late. A wide variety of chants were assigned to Masses for the dead, and the selection of propers was simply the decision of whoever oversaw the compilation of a particular manuscript. The complete formulary we have today was not settled until after the Council of Trent in the 16c.

St. Augustine tells us at Matins today that the liturgy takes us into the loving heart of Mother Church, who is pia mater communis, a solicitous mother of all. She forgets none of her children, even when they have died and their name is no longer remembered. She prays and offers the Sacrifice of Atonement for them all. As with all liturgical prayer, we should strive to make these prayers our own. A sublime quiet hovers over the today's prayers and chants; they express unbounded confidence in God's merciful love. The liturgies of the dead from early Christian centuries reflect the words: quia pius es. . .. You, O God, are goodness, mildness, and mercy, and this spirit pervades today's Introit, Gradual, (Tract), and Communion. Around the 11th and 12th centuries, we begin to find an emphasis on the idea of judgement and punishment for sin as the doctrines of Purgatory and Hell began to solidify and become normative. A shift in grammar also occurs, as the subjunctive begins to replace the indicative in the verbs. Hence the initial impression of the Sequence Dies Irae is one of fear and damnation. But a more careful reading quickly tells us that initial impression is not entirely the case even in the Sequence: pie Jesu Domine dona eis requiem it concludes. And the elegant Preface makes an even stronger statement: vita morietur, non tollitur. Our current liturgy of the dead, then, is a masterfully blended perspective of many elements: the purely human and natural sadness over the departure of loved ones, the reality of the judgement we all face, and confidence in the Resurrection of our Lord as a promise of eternal life. The interpretation and proclamation of today's chants should reflect that.





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
