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ST. JOHN'S DAY WINE BLESSING

St. John, the Beloved Apostle, was once given poisoned wine by his enemies. After blessing the wine, he was able to drink it unharmed. From this event, the Church developed the pious custom of blessing wine on the Feast of St. John. To receive the St. John blessing for your wine, please attend St. John's Mass on 27 December at 12:15 pm, and place your bottle near the St. Joseph Altar before NOON. Please be sure to label your bottle with your name.

At least some of the wine blessed on the feast should be enjoyed on the day of the feast itself. When it is drunk on his feast day, we drink it before dinner as a toast to St. John. The father of the house lifts his glass toward mother and says, "I drink you the love of St. John." The mother replies "I thank you for the love of St. John" and then turns to the oldest child, lifts her glass, and says, "I drink you the love of St. John..." —and on it goes down the line until each has been toasted.

DEVOTION TO THE HOLY FACE OF JESUS - BOOKS

Please accept a copy of "The Secret of the Holy Face" by Fr. Lawrence Carney as a donation to all parishioners available

in the vestibule of the Church today. Given the course of events occurring in our country and within the Church, especially with regard to the current growth of Communism, it is recommended that Catholics understand and pray the Holy Face Devotion. This powerful devotion was given to mankind by our Lord and evolved as a weapon to combat the evils of Communism when it first appeared. Though the devotion became less popular, primarily after Vatican II, many Catholics now believe there is an urgent and renewed need for this prayerful exercise given its promises.

Numerous miracles are associated with this devotion which has the full approval of the Catholic Church. In 1843 the Lord spoke these words Sr. Marie de Saint Pierre, a Carmelite nun, in Tours:

"The earth is covered with crimes. The violation of the first three Commandments of God has irritated My Father. The Holy Name of God blasphemed, and the Holy Day of the Lord profaned, filling up the measure of iniquities. These sins have risen into the throne of God and provoked his wrath which will soon burst forth if justice be not appeased. At no time have these crimes reached such a pitch."

In 1845, the Reparative Mystery of the Holy Face was revealed to Sister Saint-Pierre as the Lord stated: "I seek Veronicas to wipe and venerate My Holy Face which has few adorers... and by My Holy Face, you will work many miracles."

The Lord gave Sister Saint-Pierre the Golden Arrow prayer as special reparation for blasphemy. She then prayed the rosary asking Our Lady's intercession in helping her to get the Lord's message to others. Shortly thereafter Mary's apparition at La Salette followed which affirmed the Lord's words to Sister Saint-Pierre, "The Church will be in eclipse."

The revelations to Sister Saint Pierre are also at the foundation of Our Lady's warning at Fatima, regarding the spread of atheistic errors of secular humanism, Socialism, and religious suppression contained in Communism and of revolutionary men.

Please consider studying and praying the Holy Face Devotion for our country and for Holy Mother Church in these challenging times.

A STORY ABOUT OUR BELL

Christians and secularists alike take for granted the presence of bells in old church bell towers. The Church's use of large bells to summon the faithful to prayer stretches back to the roots of monasticism in third century A.D. However, what many do not know is that bells are not simply a nostalgic remnant from a bygone era, but living sacramentals which bear an important role in spiritual warfare and the sanctification of the world around us.

The blessing of church bells, so sacramentally rich it is often called a Baptism, began as early as the 11th century. At a bell's Baptism, which may only be performed by a bishop, it is washed with Holy Water, anointed inside and out with both Chrism and the Oil of the Sick, incensed, and prayed over with the solemn words:

Let the people's faith and piety wax stronger whenever they hear its melodious peals. At its sound let all evil spirits be driven afar; let thunder and lightning, hail and storm be banished; let the power of your hand put down the evil powers of the air, causing them to tremble at the sound of this bell, and to flee at the sight of the holy cross engraved thereon ... when the peal of this bell resounds in the clouds may a legion of angels stand watch over the assembly of your Church, the first-fruits of the faithful, and afford your ever-abiding protection to them in body and spirit.

Thus, even though we do not see our bell up in the tower here at the Oratory, we can be sure that its peals have true

spiritual power against the forces of darkness which we see running rampant even here in the very neighborhood of the church.

After spring rains damaged the electrical system which previously rang the Oratory bell, a team of Oratory members conducted a brief study on how to make our bell ring once again. They determined that the simplest solution was also the most traditional - to restore the bell's manual pull-rope system which had been abandoned sometime in the '60s. The original weathered old rope and great wooden wheel still rest in the corner of the bell tower amidst decades' accumulation of pigeon and squirrel bones.

Now, about fifty feet of new rope runs from the bell's current iron wheel through special holes in the bell tower's two tall stories straight into the side choir loft where it is accessible to the altar boy tasked with the porter's duty of ringing the bell. Manual ringing by rope not only allows the bell to swing as it was designed even as far as 360 degrees around its cradle and thus produce a more beautiful sound, it also bears a greater spiritual beauty. Whether the bell rings in fast "peals" on joyous occasions, or slow "tolls" for days of sorrow, one knows that a member of the faithful, usually a young boy, uses his own hands to ring the bell with prayer and love; it no longer owes its voice to a soulless electrical system installed merely for ease and convenience.

May we faithful of the Oratory thank the Lord for the gift of our bell and keep our hearts ever open to the bountiful graces it brings.

WELLSPRING OF TRADITION: THE CHRISTMAS MARTYROLOGY

Each morning other than during the Sacred Triduum, at the end of the canonical hour of Prime, we chant a selection from *The Roman Martyrology* or *Martyrologium Romanum* for the following day. The date is always given first from the solar calendar, which follows the course of the sun through the year, the basis of most secular calendars today. Then the date is given for the Lunar Calendar, which is the historical calendar used in Jewish and other traditions. This double date citation preserves our descent from and connection to Judaic liturgy of the Second Temple as well as our role as the 'New Israel' referred to in the Divine Office.

This selection is a public announcement of the principal saints and/or events in the life of Our Lord or Our Blessed Mother that the Church will celebrate on the following day. On the eve of Christmas, there is a special introduction to the usual entries for that day that announces the birth of Our Lord within the context of human history, emphasizing that His birth was an actual historical event that took place in real time in a real place. Over time, this formula was expanded and given a more elaborate melody than the simple Prophecy Tone used for the rest of the Martyrology. The past few years, we here at the Oratory have been using a particularly lovely tone from the Casinese Congregation, the Benedictine congregation that takes its name from the monastery of Monte Casino, where S Benedict died on 21 March, 547 A.D. We use some of these Casinese tones also for the lessons of Christmas Matins and of Tenebrae, as well as some of the epistles and gospels on Christmas and Easter.

It has become customary in many places in recent decades to chant this introductory portion of the Martyrology for 25 December one additional time, as a 'Christmas Proclamation' as a prelude to Midnight Mass, after Christmas Matins has concluded. If you tune into Midnight Mass broadcast from the Vatican, you will hear a Novus Ordo simplified version of the this text chanted by a deacon before the Mass. Those who attend Midnight Mass at the Oratory will hear the traditional text chanted before Holy Mass by one of the schola from the Sanctuary. The text is given below:

Octavo Kalendas Januarii Luna vicésima quarta. Anno a creatióne mundi, quando in princípio Deus creávit cælum et terram, quinquiés millésimo centésimo nonagésimo nono; a dilúvio autem, anno bis millésimo nongentésimo quinquagésimo séptimo; a nativitáte Abrahæ, anno bis millésimo quintodécimo; a Móyse et egréssu pópuli Israël de Ægýpto, anno millésimo quingentésimo décimo; ab unctióne David in Regem, anno millésimo trigésimo secúndo; Hebdómada sexagésima quinta, juxta Daniélis prophétiam; Olympíade centésima nonagésima quarta; ab urbe Roma cóndita, anno septingentésimo quinquagésimo secúndo; anno Impérii Octaviáni Augústi quadragésimo secúndo, toto Orbe in pace compósito, sexta mundi ætáte, Jesus Christus, ætérnus Deus æterníque Patris Fílius, mundum volens advéntu suo piíssimo consecráre, de Spíritu Sancto concéptus, novémque post conceptiónem decúrsis ménsibus Hic vox elevatur, et omnes genua flectunt, in Béthlehem Judæ náscitur ex María Vírgine factus Homo. Hic autem in priori voce dicitur, et in tono passionis: Natívitas Dómini nostri Jesu Christi secúndum carnem.

December 25th 2024, the 24th day of the Moon.


