FROM THE RECTOR

Our Gospel from St. John reminds us of the intimacy that is the relationship between the Father and the Son. Ask the Lord to send more laborers in the field and increase priestly vocations.

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NEW CONFESSIONAL LIGHTS

The two confessionals in Church now have lights indicating when the priest is present and when the confessional itself is available. The light for the priest is a white light at the top of the confessional where the priest sits. The penitent's light is only on one side of each of the two confessionals. When the light is green it is free; when the light is red it is occupied. Please only approach the side of the confessional that has a light indicating its availability. Going forward, the unlit side of each confessional will not be operative. A special word of gratitude is extended to Michael McMahon for agreeing to oversee this project to its completion. The Oratory is grateful for his generosity and ingenuity.

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PRIESTHOOD ORDINATION

On Wednesday, 28 May 2025 @ 10:00 am, Rev. Mr. Steven Kalinowski will be ordained to the sacred and holy priesthood for the Priestly Fraternity of Saint Peter at Saint Peter's Church in Lincoln, Nebraska. Deacon Kalinowski has been studying at the Fraternity seminary in Denton, Nebraska, Our Lady of Guadalupe, and is a parishioner of the Oratory of Ss. Gregory and Augustine. His parents, Robert and Barbara Kalinowski, and sisters, Anna and Kristin Kalinowski, are also parishioners of the Oratory. The Oratory is grateful to have played a small part in supporting Deacon Kalinowski's vocation to the priesthood. So too, we are grateful for his generous service at the altar for Holy Mass and for calling the Oratory his home.

The newly ordained Fr. Kalinowski will celebrate a Mass of Thanksgiving here at the Oratory of Ss. Gregory and Augustine on Sunday, 1 June 2025 @ 10:00 am. Everyone is encouraged to attend Holy Mass and to greet the newly ordained priest. When a priest celebrates his First Mass after ordination, it is an opportunity for the faithful in attendance to gain a plenary indulgence if all the usual conditions are met. Holy Mother Church updated this tradition by granting a plenary indulgence to all first Masses the priest celebrates. The additional first Masses are sometimes called Masses of Thanksgiving.

Fr. Kalinowski will offer his first priestly blessing at the conclusion of Holy Mass at the St. Joseph altar rail. Although not a plenary indulgence, an additional grace may be gained from receiving the first blessing of a newly ordained priest. First blessings are customarily given when first Masses are celebrated, but they may be given up to a full year after ordination.

Following Holy Mass and First Blessings, cake and soft drinks will be served in the Oratory Piazza (white tent area). All of the faithful are encouraged to attend.

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FIRST CONFESSION

On Saturday, 12 April 2025, 19 young people of the Oratory of Ss. Gregory & Augustine received their First Confession. I am grateful to their teachers in preparing them well and to Jake and Terri Fowler for their leadership of our CCD Program. Please continue to pray for all our young people enrolled in the CCD program here at the Oratory especially those preparing for Confirmation and First Holy Communion.

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SUMMER SCHEDULE

While this is several months away, to allow the faithful of the Oratory to plan accordingly, the Oratory will again implement the summer schedule. Beginning on Tuesday, 1 July 2025 and concluding on Thursday, 14 August 2025 the Oratory will have one daily Holy Mass at 12:15 pm with Confessions at 11:00 am. The Saturday and Sunday schedules will remain the same. The offices hours during this time will be Monday through Thursday from 8:00 am until 2:30 pm. The offices will be closed on Fridays. In order to assist the priests and the staff, please do not anticipate any parish business on Fridays. These scheduling changes allow the priests of the Oratory to take vacation and more importantly to make their canonical retreats. So too, the changed office hours will allow our dedicated staff time for vacation. As we move closer to the month of July, more information will be provided.

THE COMMUNION RAIL

In recent weeks there have been several incidents where the faithful have fallen from the communion rail after receiving Holy Communion. The severity of the injuries has varied, but sadly this has occurred far too often. I would ask everyone to be attentive to the step up AND down at the communion rail. Please be aware of those with any mobility issues and assist them if no ushers are present. If you bring someone new to the Oratory for Holy Mass, please remind them of the step at the communion rail or if you see someone struggling, please assist them. If the community is more cognizant of this at the time of communion it is hoped that the accidents can cease. Please pray for those who have fallen, especially for a swift recovery from their injuries.

WHAT ARE STOLE FEES?

It is customary in the Catholic Church for the provision of the clergy to offer "stole fees," at baptisms, weddings, funerals, or the blessing of homes. These stipends form a part of the compensation for the clergy. Most priests don't want to sound greedy or ungrateful, so stole fees are not often mentioned or taught about, but because people are not aware of them, the faithful usually find it helpful to learn that they do exist (and that the priests are grateful for your generosity!).

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These fees are not obligatory but are given as a sign of appreciation and support for the clergy's work. The Catholic Church emphasizes that these fees should not be seen as payment for sacraments, which are free gifts of God. The clergy at the Oratory are particularly keen to make clear that no one who asks for a sacrament will ever be denied for lack of a stole fee.

In our archdiocese, there are suggested amounts that people usually give, and that information will be shared with you by the office when the event is scheduled. Thank you!

WELLSPRING OF TRADITION: Alleluia is our song

On the eve of Septuagesima, we celebrate the burial or *depositio* of the Alleluia, a solemn and emotional way of saying farewell to the most beloved of Christian chants. For most of us living in the 21st century, words are commonplace, used in innumerable ways in multiple media every day, to the point of overload. It may be difficult for us to grasp how a single word could command such affection and awe, and how its removal from the daily language of the liturgy could cause such a deeply emotional sense of loss. Yet such has been the role of the word *Alleluia* in the life of the Church. It has been the Church's announcement of the resurrection and a call to salvation since our earliest days.

The Hebrew word *Halleluya*, meaning 'praise God,' is a mystical word found in the Old and New Testaments, particularly in the Psalms. Early Christians adopted it for several purposes. Informally, it was an expression of joy, of gratitude for salvation, and of their faith in the triumphant return of the Lord. Formally, they adapted it for their own emerging liturgies from its use in the Temple, where priests sang it as part of the 'hallel' psalms (Pss. 112-117), the last of which which may well have been the 'hymn' that Matthew and Mark tell us our divine Lord and the apostles sang after the Last Supper. As Christian liturgical forms became more solidly established, the use of the Alleluia as a psalm response and/or a greeting for the Gospel became the norm. And so we find it in the ancient Greek Liturgy of St. James and the prototype of the Maronite liturgy, and in the ancient Liturgy of St. Mark. From very early days it was used more heavily from Easter to Pentecost, perhaps because the the *hallel* psalms were chanted by Jews at Passover.

Tertullian wrote in the 3rd century that the faithful of his time used to insert many alleluias in their private devotions. A century later, St. Jerome praised the pious farmers and tradesmen who used to sing it at their toil and the mothers who taught their babies to pronounce Alleluia before any other word. In the Roman Empire the Alleluia became the favorite prayerful song of oarsmen and navigators. Saint Augustine alluded to this custom, saying, 'Let the Alleluia be our sweet rowing-song!' The Roman poet and bishop Sidonius Apollinaris wrote how the river banks and shores of Gaul resounded with the Alleluia song of the rowing boatmen. Roman soldiers fighting against pagan barbarians used it as battle cry and war song. In his history of England, the Venerable Bede reported an 'Alleluia victory' won by the Christian Bretons over the Picts and Scots in 429. St. Thomas Aquinas said 'We should be an Alleluia from head to toe.' In the early Middle Ages, the expression 'Alleluia, the Lord is risen' became the general greeting of Christians for Easter. It was also sung at funerals and burial Masses as an expression of the conviction that for a Christian the day of death was the birthday of eternal life, and so a day of joy. The Eastern rites have preserved this custom in their Masses for the dead.

The earliest references to the Alleluia as a separate element of the Roman Mass formulary are as a form of the Gradual psalm. Later, the heavy influence of the Alleluia in Byzantine liturgies led to the Alleluia becoming a chant separate from the Gradual. This happened first in the East, and then migrated to Rome. At first, the Roman singers often simply translated the Greek texts into Latin. They borrowed some of the Greek melodies, but then elaborated them with the addition of a *jubilus* (described below). Some of the more prominent examples came to be used not only in the Mass but also in an especially splendid form of Vespers celebrated at Rome during the Easter octave and eventually in other places. Pope St Gregory the Great extended the singing of the Alleluia to Sundays other than in the Easter season.

The Alleluia chant in the Mass opens with the cantor singing 'Alleluia,' after which the choir and/or the congregation repeat it, and add a long *melisma* or extended melody on the final vowel. This particular *melisma* is known as a *jubilus*. And it is indeed a 'joyful melody' as befits the singing of this word that proclaims the cardinal reality of our Christian faith: Christ is risen! The cantor then sings the main part of the verse, the choir joins in on the final line, and then all repeat the Alleluia. The musical style of the Alleluia is quite ornate, but often includes repetition of identical melodic elements. The use of melodic formulae in familiar patterns gives the singer a general view of the whole composition, affording him a self confidence that supports the spirit of prayer. In medieval times, Alleluias were frequently 'troped' by having other text sung to some of the notes in the *jubilus*, perhaps giving rise to early Sequences. At the Oratory, we are blessed to have our schola chant for us the soaring and inspiring melodies of the Gregorian Alleluias. Listening to these, we understand anew what prompted the famous declaration of St Augustine, 'We are an Easter people, and Alleluia is our song.'



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
