NEW CONFESSIONAL LIGHTS

The two confessionals in Church now have lights indicating when the priest is present and when the confessional itself is available. The light for the priest is a white light at the top of the confessional where the priest sits. The penitent's light is only on one side of each of the two confessionals. When the light is green it is free; when the light is red it is occupied. Please only approach the side of the confessional that has a light indicating its availability. Going forward, the unlit side of each confessional will not be operative. A special word of gratitude is extended to Michael McMahon for agreeing to oversee this project to its completion. The Oratory is grateful for his generosity and ingenuity.

SUMMER SCHEDULE

The Oratory will again implement the summer schedule. Beginning on Monday, 30 June 2025 and concluding on Thursday, 14 August 2025 the Oratory will have one daily Holy Mass at 12:15 pm with Confessions at 11:00 am. **The Saturday and Sunday schedules will**

remain the same. The offices hours during this time will be Monday through Thursday from 8:00 am until 2:30 pm. The offices will be closed on Fridays during the entire summer. In order to assist the priests and the staff, please do not anticipate any parish business on Fridays. WHAT ARE STOLE FEES?

It is customary in the Catholic Church for the provision of the clergy to offer "stole fees," at baptisms, weddings, funerals, or the blessing of homes. These stipends form a part of the compensation for the clergy. Most priests don't want to sound greedy or ungrateful, so stole fees are not often mentioned or taught about, but because people are not aware of them, the faithful usually find it helpful to learn that they do exist (and that the priests are grateful for your generosity!).

These fees are *not* obligatory but are given as a sign of appreciation and support for the clergy's work. The Catholic Church emphasizes that these fees should not be seen as payment for sacraments, which are free gifts of God. The clergy at the Oratory are particularly keen to make clear that no one who asks for a sacrament will ever be denied for lack of a stole fee.

In our archdiocese, there are suggested amounts that people usually give, and that information will be shared with you by the office when the event is scheduled. Thank you!

WELLSPRING OF TRADITION - The Feast of Corpus Christi

The feast of Corpus Christi is not an ancient one. It was first celebrated in 1247 in the diocese of Liege (in today's Belgium), at the urgent plea of an Augustinian Prioress, St. Juliana of Mont Cornillon (1193-1258). From her youth she had a recurring vision of the moon that was full and beautiful but marked by a black spot that signified that there was no joyous celebration of the Eucharist in the otherwise complete Church calendar. She began sharing her vision and prevailing upon local clergy and their superiors to inaugurate the celebration of the feast. Her efforts enjoyed limited success, in varying degrees, over the next several decades as the politics of Church and state in Germany were altered by the relationship of the emperor and the papacy. In 1261, the former Archdeacon of Liege and a friend of St. Juliana was elected Pope Urban IV. She appealed again to him to make the feast a universal one.

Then in 1263, her efforts received a boost when Peter of Prague, a German priest, during a pilgrimage to Rome, stopped at the Church of St. Christina in Bolsena to offer Mass. Although a holy and devout man, he had doubts about the Real Presence. These doubts were completely resolved when the Host he consecrated during that Mass began to bleed. He rushed to meet Pope Urban IV in Orvieto, bringing the Host with him. The Duomo (Cathedral) of Orvieto commemorates the miracle and houses the blood stained corporal that Peter of Prague used. The following year, Pope Urban extended the feast to the universal Church. However, he died shortly thereafter and it was not until Clement V re-published Urban's decree in 1311 that the feast really took hold.

St. Juliana composed the first office for the original celebration of the feast in the diocese of Liege with the aid of a monk named John, and much of it is still preserved. This office was rooted more in devotional and theological texts, stressing the emotional value of the enduring presence of Christ in the Eucharist. The Cistercians found this too simple and emotional, and composed another office. In Germany, several rhyming offices were developed. Although still debated by some, it was likely St Thomas Aquinas (1225—1274) who arranged a Roman office between 1261 and 1263 for a special celebration of the feast in Orvietto in 1264, around the time when Urban IV extended the feast to the universal church in view of his impending death. Sometime after he died, a new Roman office was composed. After much debate during the 20c, most scholars now accept that St. Thomas was the author of this office. This formulary, drawing heavily on themes St. Thomas develops in his famous sermon *Homo quidam fecit cenam magnam*, contains some of the finest liturgical texts ever written, and is the source of the texts we still use today for this feast. They remained—almost singularly—unscathed during the horrendous devastation of Urban VIII's humanistic demolition of the Office hymns. And even Bugnini's butchers left much of it intact in creating the new Divine Office for the Liturgia Horarum (Liturgy of the Hours). To have survived both of these iconoclastic periods of liturgical havoc is powerful testimony to the quality of St. Thomas's texts and the high regard in which they are held.

As anyone familiar with the enduring formulary will know, St. Thomas relied on sacred scripture, and especially the psalms, in composing his texts. He has magnificently expressed the jubilant character of the day, especially in his famous hymns, and of these most notably in *Sacris Solemniis*, which is chanted at Matins and often sung during the procession:

Sacris solemniis juncta sint gaudia, Et ex praecordiis sonent praeconia; Recedant vetera, nova sint omnia, Corda, voces, et opera. Great is the festive day, joyful and jubilant, Let us with loving hearts offer the song of praise; Freed from the sinful past, may we renew in grace All our thoughts and words and deeds.

The fifth stanza of "Sacris Solemniis," beginning *Panis Angelicus* (Bread of Angels), usually accompanied by its doxology, *Te Trina Deitas*, has been used for centuries as a separate hymn in honor of the Blessed Sacrament. It is known and cherished widely among Christians of many denominations. Besides the superb chant melogy, musical settings include those of Cesar Franck (1890), of the French Jesuit Louis Lambilotte (1855), and the powerful four-part setting usually ascribed to C. Casiolini—but which should be more correctly credited to Jacopo Tomadini (1883).

At 1st and 2nd Vespers of the feast we find the most well known hymn by St. Thomas, *Pange Lingua Gloriosi Corporis Mysterium* (Praise, o tongue, the mystery of the glorious Body). Its last two stanzas, *Tantum Ergo* and the doxolog *Genitori* are sung the world over at Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament. The best known and most beautiful musical setting of this hymn has remained the Gregorian chant melody (Mode III) in the *Antiphonale Romanum*.

For Lauds, St. Thomas wrote the hymn *Verbum Supernum Prodiens* (The Divine Word coming forth). Pius Parsch remarked in his famous liturgical commentary that the famous composer of Latin hymns, Jean-Baptiste de Santeul, (+1697) said he would give everything he ever wrote to be the author of this hymn. As with the other hymns above, the penultimate stanza plus the doxology has become another Benediction standard:

O salutaris hostia, Quae caeli pandis ostium, Bella praemunt hostilia: Da robur, fer auxilium. O saving host, o bread of life, Thou goal of rest from pain and strife, Embattled are we, poor and weak: Grant us the strength and help we seek.

Many of the antiphons for the feast have become famous as well. O Sacrum Convivium, from 2nd Vespers, has long been a favourite of composers, and is the prayer prescribed in the Rituale Romanum to be prayed when the Blessed Sacrament is returned to the tabernacle after Holy Communion has been distributed.
