FROM THE RECTOR

The virtue of humility is difficult to cultivate in any age, but particularly difficult for modern man because he is convinced of his own power and ability. Humility is the cardinal virtue because it engenders in us a docility to God's Divine Providence and an obedience to His commands and laws. As is often preached here at the Oratory, the modern age is collapsing because people refuse to be governed. Everyone believes he is his own master and is free to do as he pleases. The devastation that this idea has wrought is constantly ignored: broken families, promiscuity, the scourge of abortion and contraception, the dominance of the homosexual ethos, the emptiness of our Churches, and the confusion preached by priests and bishops alike. This refusal to be obedient is most devastating for the Church precisely because She needs to be the guard rails for the humanity, guiding God's faithful ones on the path that is straight and narrow, the only path that leads to peace and joy. As the Church has failed, society continues to give into its depravity. There is, however, always hope because Christ is victorious once and for all. This victory is real and true even when men elect a different path. We must put aside our hubris, arrogance, and disobedience and embrace the law of God which is His love written in our hearts. When we are truly honest, we know that apart from God we can do nothing. We must conquer all of our prideful impulses and submit with joy to the will of God. In our humility we will be better instruments of God's grace for our own salvation and for the salvation of the whole world.

RECEPTION OF HOLY COMMUNION

For those in our community who are new to the Traditional Latin Mass, when you approach the altar rail for holy communion it is the custom to begin filling in the altar rail at the far right near St. Joseph's altar and fill in the rail until its end at the Marian altar. This practice is not impacted by which side of the Church you happen to be seated. You are allowed, and encouraged, to switch sides in order to keep the communion line moving. This is particularly important when there are two sacred ministers distributing Holy Communion. So too, do not overly delay approaching the rail waiting for others to return to their pews. If everyone moves with attention to what is happening, there should be a flow of movement between those departing the altar rail and those approaching the altar rail. Also, for daily Holy Mass: please kneel at the rail only where the houseling cloth has been prepared for communion. Please keep in mind that we should not keep the Lord waiting but moving with grace and deliberation to the altar rail to receive our Eucharistic Lord.

THE COMMUNION RAIL

There have been several incidents where the faithful have fallen from the communion rail after receiving Holy Communion. The severity of the injuries has varied, but sadly this has occurred far too often. I would ask everyone to be attentive to the step up AND down at the communion rail. Please be aware of those with any mobility issues and assist them if no ushers are present. If you bring someone new to the Oratory for Holy Mass, please remind them of the step at the communion rail or if you see someone struggling, please assist them. If the community is more cognizant of this at the time of communion it is hoped that the accidents can cease. Please pray for those who have fallen, especially for a swift recovery from their injuries.

BLESSED ITEMS

If you wish to have items blessed, please drop them off at the rectory (Mon-Fri, 9am-2pm) and include your name and telephone number. Please make sure all items are clearly marked. Once Msgr. Morris or Fr. Rennie have blessed the items Donna Mueller, Administrative Assistant to the Rector, will call you to let you know the items are ready for pick up (from the rectory office, Mon-Thu, 9am-2pm). **Please drop off/pick up items at the front door on Dale Avenue, across from the field parking lot.**

WHAT ARE STOLE FEES?

It is customary in the Catholic Church for the provision of the clergy to offer "stole fees," at baptisms, weddings, funerals, or the blessing of homes. These stipends form a part of the compensation for the clergy. Most priests don't want to sound greedy or ungrateful, so stole fees are not often mentioned or taught about, but because people are not aware of them, the faithful usually find it helpful to learn that they do exist (and that the priests are grateful for your generosity!).

10th Sunday after Pentecost

17 August 2025

These fees are *not* obligatory but are given as a sign of appreciation and support for the clergy's work. The Catholic Church emphasizes that these fees should not be seen as payment for sacraments, which are free gifts of God. The clergy at the Oratory are particularly keen to make clear that no one who asks for a sacrament will ever be denied for lack of a stole fee.

In our archdiocese, there are suggested amounts that people usually give, and that information will be shared with you by the office when the event is scheduled. Thank you!

WELLSPRING OF TRADITION: THE KINDLY LIGHT OF THE OFFICE

Among the manifold works of John Henry (Cardinal) Newman are translations of 47 hymns from the *Breviarium Romanum*, and prefaces to two collections of translations of breviary hymns by others. These translations, done while he was still an Anglican, were intended to be part of an ambitious project undertaken by some friends of his to translate the entire Roman Breviary. Despite several attempts, the translation project was never completed. But the project sharpened Newman's focus on the Roman daily Office, and ultimately set him irreversibly on the road to full communion with Rome.¹

He had acquired his first breviary upon the death of his friend Richard Hurrell Froude in 1836. When asked to choose a book from Froude's personal library as a remembrance of his friend, his first choice was already taken. So his former pupil, Frederick Rodgers, prompted him to take the breviary set. In his later years, Newman himself noted that this was a landmark event in his life. After acquiring the set, he undertook a careful study of the breviary texts. His Tract 75 *On the Roman Breviary* was critical of some aspects and content, although in the main very complementary of its 'fullness' as compared to the daily Office in the Prayer Book. But gradually, he came to accept it *in toto*. As was also the case with his devotion to Our Lady—he began to wear the Miraculous Medal on the Octave of the Assumption, 1845—this development of his thinking and behaviour involved some internal struggle, and caused no small amount of public concern, even scandal in some quarters along the way. Advocating the use of a Roman Catholic service book by Anglicans, even if cautiously, was bold and controversial. But he remained devoted to the Divine Office for the rest of his life.

What he found in praying the Office from the breviary was a rich tradition with closer links to the prayer patterns of the Apostles and the early Church than he found in the Prayer Book. Identifying this continuity with the Church of the Apostles and the early Fathers, as well as with the late medieval Church before the Reformation, was a critical objective for him and many of his contemporaries in the Church of England. He was an important figure in the various 'movements' that shared this objective, the Oxford Movement being the most prominent. Through his praying of the breviary Office and reading the Fathers of the Church in that context, he found it increasingly difficult to remain an Anglican as he became convinced that the Roman Church was truly that same Church of the Apostles and Fathers today.

He came to understand that some aspects of the Office that he once found objectionable were actually expressions of that same patrimony he wanted so much to recover. The psalms and other texts of Sacred Scripture set amid other elements of Sacred Tradition encased in the Office texts such as antiphons, responsories, versicles, collects, and—especially—hymns, provided a context for deepening one's understanding of the scriptural and patristic readings and re-directed them as prayer and praise in the liturgy.

To summarize Dr. Withey's conclusions: Led by the kindly light of the Divine Office, Newman found in the Church of Rome the continuity with the Apostolic Church that he had so long sought—but ultimately not completely found—in his native Anglican communion. It is not surprising that Pope Benedict XVI, the proponent in our own time of the essential continuity of the Church and her Tradition through the centuries, should find in Newman a kindred spirit. There is continuity both in the ongoing praise Christ offers to the Father in His Church and also in the theological content of the prayer formulae. Recently, Archbishop Malcolm Ranjith (former secretary of the Congregation for Divine Worship, now Archbishop of Colombo) drew attention again to an exhortation of Pope Benedict that when praying the Office we should 'aim to pray it as a true prayer, a prayer in communion with the Israel of the Old and New Testaments, a prayer in communion with all who pray throughout history, a prayer in communion with Jesus Christ, a prayer that arises from the deepest 'I', from the deepest subject of these prayers.'²
