THE MOST IMPORTANT THING, ACCORDING TO ST. LOUIS

During his lifetime, St. Louis was beloved as a ruler, freeing all the serfs who had been forced into unjust labor on farms, personally inviting poor citizens to dine at his table, and reforming the court system to make it more fair and to guarantee natural rights. He also founded several hospitals for the care of those who couldn't afford medical care.

King Louis was also powerful in international politics, and was called upon to mediate disputes between other European rulers, including Pope Innocent IV and Emperor Frederick II.

He was famous for courage. At one point during his crusading adventures, he was captured and held prisoner in a tent. His captors offered him freedom if he would swear an oath against God. While he made up his mind, they tried to motivate him by holding swords to his throat and threatening to massacre other Christians they were holding captive. It turns out, St. Louis didn't really need time to think. He quickly and steadfastly refused to deny his faith.

St. Louis led an accomplished life. He had 11 children, maintained a strong and united kingdom, led armies, retrieved the crown of thorns from the Middle East, and built Sainte-Chapelle to house it. This little church is one of the jewels of Medieval architecture.

We are going through a litany of his accomplishments in order to show a contrast, because the accomplishments and power don't seem to have meant all that much to the great saint. He always signed his name as, "Louis of Poissy," and never signed or referred to himself as, "Louis IX, King of France."

Poissy is where he was baptized, and he said, "I think more of the place where I was baptized than of Rheims Cathedral where I was crowned. It is a greater thing to be a child of God than to be the ruler of a Kingdom. This last I shall lose at death but the other will be my passport to an everlasting glory."

This is a startling lesson in keeping perspective. The things we hold dear pale in comparison to the miracle of baptismal regeneration. Louis of Poissy witnesses that the very wellspring of existence is a miracle. He carries this memory of his eternal destiny with him his entire life and it guides all of his actions. All the great accomplishments are echos of that one, over-arching moment in which he was reborn.

ADULTS SEEKING THE SACRAMENTS OF INITIATION

We welcome those interested in becoming Catholic. To get started in that process within the OSGA community, please email one of our priests for an introductory meeting. Their contacts are available in the bulletin. After this, candidates for Initiation at the Oratory will be

directed to complete a registration form with our Administrator.

Catechism classes are held in the St Joseph Room (rectory basement) generally on a bi-monthly basis, the second and fourth Wednesdays from 4-5PM.

The content surrounds a set of topics central to Catholic teaching, as set forth by Msgr. Morris. Deacon Pieper moderates most meetings through a questions and answer format and hopes to promote sincere dialogue with the candidates regarding those topics and/or related questions. The intent is to communicate Christ and His Church. Sacraments are offered on an individual basis, on a rolling schedule throughout the year, after mutual discernment by the candidate, our deacon and priests.

RECEPTION OF HOLY COMMUNION

For those in our community who are new to the Traditional Latin Mass, when you approach the altar rail for holy communion it is the custom to begin filling in the altar rail at the far right near St. Joseph's altar and fill in the rail until its end at the Marian altar. This practice is not impacted by which side of the Church you happen to be seated. You are allowed, and encouraged, to switch sides in order to keep the communion line moving. This is particularly important when there are two sacred ministers distributing Holy Communion. So too, do not overly delay approaching the rail waiting for others to return to their pews. If everyone moves with attention to what is happening, there should be a flow of movement between those departing the altar rail and those approaching the altar rail. Also, for daily Holy Mass: please kneel at the rail only where the houseling cloth has been prepared for communion. Please keep in mind that we should not keep the Lord waiting but moving with grace and deliberation to the altar rail to receive our Eucharistic Lord.

THE COMMUNION RAIL

There have been several incidents where the faithful have fallen from the communion rail after receiving Holy Communion. The severity of the injuries has varied, but sadly this has occurred far too often. I would ask everyone to be attentive to the step up AND down at the communion rail. Please be aware of those with any mobility issues and assist them if no ushers are present. If you bring someone new to the Oratory for Holy Mass, please remind them of the step at the communion rail or if you see someone struggling, please assist them. If the community is more cognizant of this at the time of communion it is hoped that the accidents can cease. Please pray for those who have fallen, especially for a swift recovery from their injuries.

If you wish to have items blessed, please drop them off at the rectory (Mon-Fri, 9am-2pm) and include your name and telephone number. Please make sure all items are clearly marked. Once Msgr. Morris or Fr. Rennier have blessed the items Donna Mueller, Administrative Assistant to the Rector, will call you to let you know the items are ready for pick up (from the rectory office, Mon-Thu, 9am-2pm). Please drop off/pick up items at the front door on Dale Avenue, across from the field parking lot.

WHAT ARE STOLE FEES?

It is customary in the Catholic Church for the provision of the clergy to offer "stole fees," at baptisms, weddings, funerals, or the blessing of homes. These stipends form a part of the compensation for the clergy. Most priests don't want to sound greedy or ungrateful, so stole fees are not often mentioned or taught about, but because people are not aware of them, the faithful usually find it helpful to learn that they do exist (and that the priests are grateful for your generosity!).

These fees are *not* obligatory but are given as a sign of appreciation and support for the clergy's work. The Catholic Church emphasizes that these fees should not be seen as payment for sacraments, which are free gifts of God. The clergy at the Oratory are particularly keen to

make clear that no one who asks for a sacrament will ever be denied for lack of a stole fee.

In our archdiocese, there are suggested amounts that people usually give, and that information will be shared with you by the office when the event is scheduled. Thank you!

WELLSPRING OF TRADITION: SAINT LOUIS IX, KING OF FRANCE

This evening we will begin celebrating the solemn feast of the patron of our Archdiocese and our City, St. Louis King of France. The summary of his life given below is taken from the Lessons of the 2nd Nocturn at Matins found in the Roman Breviary for his feast. We hope that a great many people can find time in their busy Monday to be with us for at least some of the Office and the Solemn Mass. The full schedule is appended to this bulletin.

Louis IX, King of France, was born on the 25th day of April, in the year of our Lord 1215. At the age of twelve years he lost his father. He was brought up under the godly care of his mother, Blanche of Castile. In the twentieth year of his reign he fell grievously sick, and the thought then occurred to him of delivering Jerusalem out of the hands of the Moslems. On his health being restored, he received a banner from the Bishop of Paris, and crossed the sea (to Egypt) with a very great army. In his first battle he put the Saracens to flight, but, a great number of the soldiers perishing by disease, he was himself conquered and taken prisoner.

The King afterwards entered into treaty with the Saracens, and he and his army departed in peace. He remained five years in the East, during which he redeemed great numbers of Christians from slavery among the unbelievers, and also brought many of the unbelievers themselves to believe in Christ. Moreover, he rebuilt several cities of the Christians at his own cost. Meanwhile, his mother, Bl Blanche of Castile, departed this life, whereby he was constrained to return home, where he gave himself up entirely to works of godliness.

He built many monasteries and charitable institutions for the poor. By his alms he relieved the needy, and often visited the sick, for whom he not only provided at his own cost, but waited on them with his own hands with such things as they wanted. He wore a plain dress and constantly chastised his body with hair-cloth and fasting. In the year 1270 he crossed the sea to Tunis to make war again upon the Saracens. His camp was pitched in sight of the enemy, but he was seized with pestilence and died uttering the words of the psalmist 'I will come into thy house I will worship toward thy holy temple and praise thy Name.' His body was afterwards carried to Paris, and it is kept and honored in the famous Abbey Church of St. Denis, but his head in the oratory called La Sainte Chapelle. He was renowned for miracles, and Pope Boniface VIII enrolled his name among those of the Saints.




