PRESENTATIONS ON THE MASS AS SACRIFICE

This series of talks is a continuation of the initial presentations on the Holy Mass celebrated in the Extraordinary Form. In October 2020, three presentations covered a cursory overview the Holy Mass and then the second and third presentations went into specifically details about the structure and parts of the Mass of the Catechumens and the Mass of the Faithful.

These talks will serve to expose us more deeply to the Mass as Sacrifice. Taking place during the Lenten season, these reflections will also serve to prepare us well for the depth of the mystery celebrated during the Sacred Triduum and the joyous celebration of Easter. During these talks, the following topics will be covered: the Holy Mass and the mysteries of Christ; the Holy Mass and the Paschal Mystery; the Holy Mass and the expiation of sins; the graces of the Holy Mass; how to devoutly assist at Holy Mass. Adults 18 and over are encouraged to attend these evenings.
